land arrived in Pictou about six years ago with a view to
remain in the County That he has now a wife and six
children and having never received any lands from Govern-
ment is desirous of obtaining an Order of Survey in the
Philadelphia Grant for any quantity of land that your
Excellency may judge proper That no oath of allegiance
has ever been administered to him but he is ready to afford
this mark of attachment to Government when called to do so
He therefore prays that your Excellency will be pleased to take
his Memorial into consideration and your Memorialist as
in duty bound shall ever pray &c &c &c
